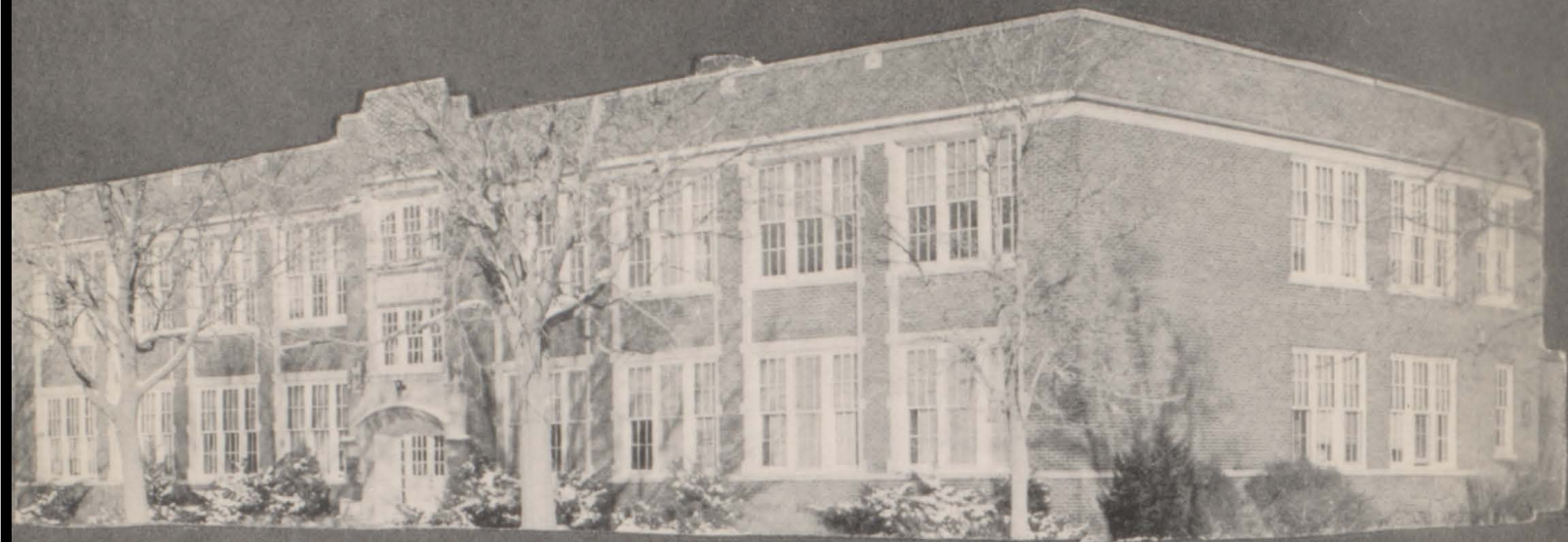

Unhalting through our freshman year he humored us and made us forget our high school fears.

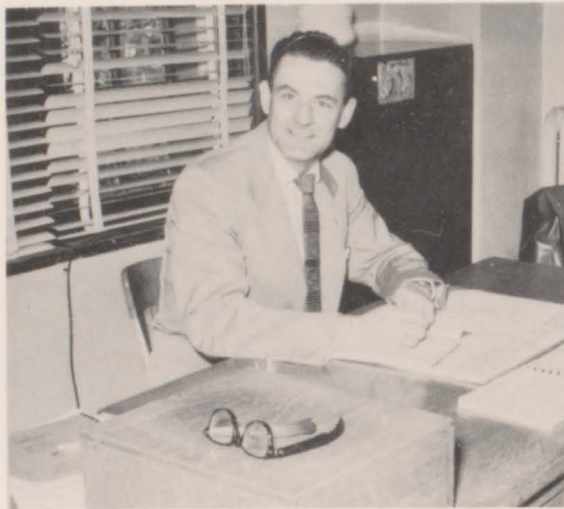
Then when we really needed him, for the Junior prom he came through in great style.

SUMMARY OF GAMES

Hawarden, sporting a crop of newcomers to the football scene, began a mediocre season by placing a bur under the saddle of the Siouxland Conference experts by upsetting highly favored Akron 27-7. Scoring was divided evenly between Treiber and Janvrin. Skip scored on runs of 33 and 45 yards. Treiber scored on a 21-yard run and pass play from Janvrin, and a 2-yard plunge.

After a scoreless first half, Hawarden slowly began to roll against Academy with Janvrin plunging from the three for our first tally. Still trailing after Academy's pair of TD's in the third quarter, Janvrin put the game on ice with a 55-yard sprint for our winning TD. Janvrin converted both extra points. 14-12.

Hawarden's inexperience finally caught up with them at Lemars. The Bulldogs showed the advantages of a good T-formation offense by doing everything right to the tune of 39-10. In the scoring department, Treiber plunged from the two yard line and Janvrin converted the PTD. A stalled Comet drive late in the second quarter was climaxed by a 27 yard field goal by Janvrin to end the Comet scoring for that evening.

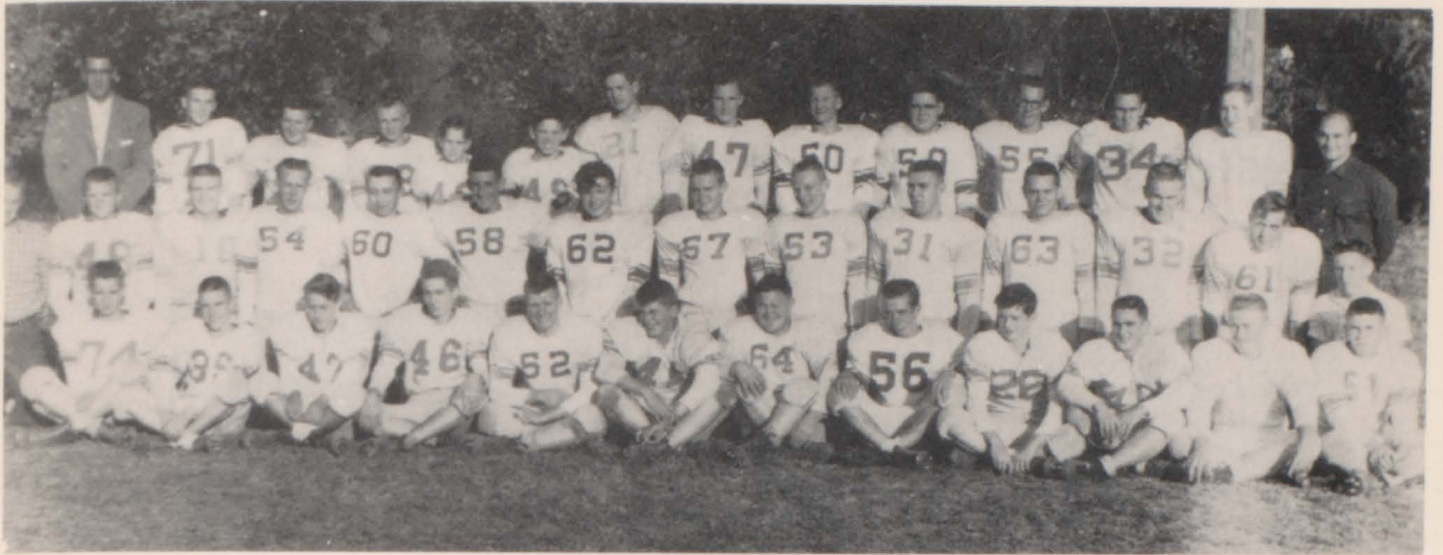
The Comet defense, valiantly trying to quell the Cardinals line bursting-belly-series, ran out of gas on the home field, 28-6. The big, fast Nebraska team scored in every quarter of this non-confer tilt. Their defense was effective in penetrating only once as Ken scotted 78-yards for Hawarden's lone tally.

The Comet Eleven, traveling to Vermillion, were confronted by a team of healthy with heavy line men and fast Backs. Hawarden's offense was moving well in this afternoon game, but gradually became outscored 35-19. Janvrin contributed all of the Comet scores one from the 53-yard mark on the second play of the game. Sharp line play was featured throughout the game.

The Homecoming event featured the Comets losing to highly favored Gehlan of LeMars in its first league defeat. Gehlan proved themselves Siouxland Conference Champions with this fourth loopwin 47-7. Hawarden's lone touchdown and extra point was contributed by Janvrin.

Because of the widespread outbreak of influenza in Siouxland communities, the Comets were forced to cancel two league games this year. The flu riddled Orange City and Rock Rapids teams which as a result offered no chance of Hawarden's advancement in Conference standings.

Following the Conference cancelations with Rock Rapids this year, the Comets met, as a replacement, a hard playing SouthDakota team, Elk Point, on the home field. The Pointers, who had never been scored upon before in play, proved too much for our local heroes as they went on to win 35-19. Janvrin barrelled for three touchdowns and an extra point.
